Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission to order and stated for the record that the meeting had been properly posted and all required notifications had been made.

The Minutes from the April 18, May 4, and May 18, 2007 meetings were considered for approval. Mrs. Pinson made a motion to approve the Minutes as drafted. Mr. Pritchard seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino reported on voting system upgrade certification. Ms. Andino stated that Election Systems and Software (ES&S) has presented a Voting System Upgrade of Version 3.0.1.1. The Commission was provided a copy of the Examination and Testing Report compiled by Mrs. Royson and Mr. Debney.

Mrs. Royson reported that on April 16th, ES&S Staff gave a presentation which included initial examination and testing. A step-by-step build of a General Election database was used to outline all changes between the previously certified version and the proposed version, to explain system changes, and test functionality of the upgrade. These tests were successful as to the functionality of voting systems as required by the South Carolina Code of Laws. The ES&S Unity 3.0.1.1 Voting System was tested by SysTest Labs, an Independent Testing Authority (ITA), accredited by the National Association of State Election Directors (NASED). As of January 1, 2007, the United States Election Assistance Commission (EAC) began the HAVA requirement of accreditation of ITA's and has accredited SysTest Labs to test voting systems against the 2002 and 2005 Voting Systems Standards. ES&S does not have any plans to test Unity 3.0.1.1 against the 2005 Voting Systems Standards and therefore will not receive an EAC certification on this version.

Chairman Hudgens requested Ms. Andino contact the Attorney General's office to obtain legal advice on the statutory requirements for voting system certification.

Mrs. Pinson made a motion to defer decision of ES&S Voting System upgrade of Version 3.0.1.1 until the June 22nd or June 28th commission meeting. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the status of the voter registration system reimbursement request. Ms. Andino reported that a letter was received from Eddie Gunn of the Budget and Control Board outlining the details of the reimbursement offer. The Budget and Control Board offered to reimburse the State Election Commission a total of \$300,000 of the \$1.4M requested. Ms. Andino recommended that the State Election Commission decline the offer and work toward a more equitable.

Chairman Hudgens advised Ms. Andino to discuss the offer and our options with the Attorney General's office.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the status of the S-99 Presidential Preference Primary. Ms. Andino stated that the amended S-99 Bill for the State Election Commission to conduct the 2008 Presidential Preference Primaries will be debated by the House today.


Ms. Andino reported on the status of the request for an Attorney General's Opinion concerning meeting requirements for the certification of election results. Ms. Andino handed out a copy of the May 18th Attorney General's Opinion that the State Board of Canvassers may not meet via telephone conference call. Ms. Andino stated that the Board can work on getting this provision changed.

Ms. Andino reported that Lancaster County has requested reimbursement for a previously purchased voting system. The SC HAVA State Plan included reimbursement for counties who had replaced punch card voting systems following the 2000 General Election. Since the State Plan was written, other states have been told by the Election Assistance Commission (EAC) that this is not an allowable expense because it is not reasonable to fund the expense twice. We have requested clarification from the EAC.

The Commission will meet on June 22, 2007 at 10 a.m. to certify Senate District 44 special primary and hold its monthly meeting in the Columbia office. The Commission will meet again on June 28, 2007 to certify Senate District 46 special election

Mr. Pritchard made a motion to adjourn the meeting of the State Election Commission. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

THE MEETING OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION WAS HELD PURSUANT TO THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT AND ALL REQUIRED NOTIFICATIONS WERE MADE.

Chairman Hudgens called the State Election Commission meeting to order.

Chairman Hudgens announced those present for the benefit of Mr. Pritchard joining the meeting by conference call.

The minutes of the May 30, 2007 meeting were considered for approval. Mr. Pritchard moved to approve the minutes. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Hudgens asked Ms. Andino for an update on developments relating to the voting system upgrade certification.

Ms. Andino reminded the commission that this issue was carried over from the last meeting pending an opinion from the State Attorney General. Ms. Andino stated a voting system cannot be certified by the SEC without first being certified by a testing laboratory accredited by the Federal Election Assistance Commission (EAC). Ms. Andino stated that as we discussed last month, ES&S Unity version 3.0.1.1 was certified by a laboratory that is currently accredited by the EAC, but the EAC had not taken over voting system certification when the software was approved by the lab. Ms. Andino stated she had requested an opinion from the State Attorney General's office on whether the Commission could approve the system under these circumstances and shared with the board a letter sent in response to her request. The Attorney General concluded in the letter that the State cannot approve a voting system certified by a laboratory, which at the time of certification was not accredited by the EAC.

Ms. Andino stated that after requesting this opinion it was discovered that Systest laboratory that certified version 3.0.1.1 was operating under an interim accreditation from

the EAC. Chairman Hudgens stated that this would seem to open the door for the SEC to certify the system.

Mrs. Pinson made a motion to certify ES&S Unity version 3.0.1.1. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

The next item on the agenda was the voter registration system update. Ms. Andino reminded the Commission that Eddie Gunn had offered a \$300,000 refund. Since the Commission spent \$1.4 million, Ms. Andino declined the offer and will work with the State Budget and Control Board to reach a more equitable resolution.

The next item of business was the Presidential Preference Primary (PPP). Ms. Andino stated that the Governor's veto of the legislation was overridden, and the legislature passed the budget containing a proviso requiring the SEC and county election commission to conduct the PPP. She stated there has been some discussion about the Republican and Democratic parties possibly holding their primaries on the same date. A meeting is planned next week with the political parties to discuss conduct of the PPP.

Mr. Green made a motion to move the meeting of the SEC into recess and to call a meeting of the State Board of Canvassers to order. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Board of Canvassers to order for the purpose of certifying the results of the Senate District 44 Republican Primary and the Senate District 46 Special Election.

Ms. Andino read the results of the Senate District 44 Republican Primary and stated that the results have been verified and found to be true and accurate in all respects. She stated that the results necessitated a runoff election to be held on July 3, 2007. Mr. Green made a motion to certify the results and order the runoff. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino read the results of the Senate District 46 Special Election and stated that the results have been verified and found to be true and accurate in all respects. Mr. Green made a motion to certify the results. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Mrs. Pinson moved to adjourn the meeting of the State Board of Canvassers and reconvene the meeting of the State Election Commission. Mr. Pritchard seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned as the State Board of Canvassers and reconvened as the State Election Commission.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the status of the agency budget. The House and Senate passed the budget earlier this week and the final version was the same as was

reported during the last meeting. The budget is now on the Governor's desk for a signature. The House and Senate will take up any vetoes next week.

The next meeting will be on July 6th.

Mr. Pritchard made a motion to adjourn. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

**THE MEETING OF THE STATE BOARD OF CANVASSERS WAS HELD PURSUANT TO THE
FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT AND ALL REQUIRED NOTIFICATIONS WERE MADE.**

Commissioner Green called the meeting of the State Board of Canvassers to order for the purpose of certifying the results of the Berkeley County Senate District 44 Special Election held on Tuesday, August 7.

Ms. Andino presented the results of the Berkeley County Senate District 44 Special Election as certified to the Board. Ms. Andino advised the Board that these results are true and accurate in all material respects.

Mrs. Pinson made a motion to certify the results of Berkeley County Senate District 44 Special Election held on Tuesday, August 7. Mrs. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Green stated that the results of the Berkeley County Senate District 44 Special Election are certified by the Board of Canvassers.

Mrs. Bensch made a motion to adjourn as the Board of Canvassers and convene as the State Election Commission. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Green welcomed the State Election Commission's newest member, Mrs. Cynthia M. Bensch, stating that all seats on the Board have been filled.

Commissioner Green also welcomed Mr. Karl S. Bowers, Jr. Mr. Bowers was presented a Resolution and thanked for his dedication in serving as Chairman and a Commissioner for the State Election Commission. Commissioner Green thanked Mr. Bowers for his personal guidance to him while he was serving as an attorney with the Attorney General's Office and while working with election law issues when he served at the House Judiciary Committee. Commissioner Green stated that Mr. Bowers's leadership was outstanding and the Commission continues to do the work and recognizes his accomplishments.

Mr. Bowers expressed his appreciation for the Resolution and commended the State Election Commission for doing a fantastic job. Mr. Bowers stated that he was proud to have served on the Commission and was proud that the Commission never made a decision that was politically driven and never had a judicial court overturn a decision during his tenure as Commissioner.

Chairman Hudgens interjected that Mr. Bowers always conducted himself in a professional manner during important events such as hearings, and always made decisions that were pure and right.

Mr. Bowers responded that the State Election Commission is a tremendous Commission and he was honored to accept this Resolution.

The minutes of the June 22 and July 6 meetings were reviewed and considered for approval. Mrs. Pinson made a motion to approve the slate of Minutes as submitted to the Board. Mrs. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino reported that "Dan Rather Reports" aired a segment on HDNet critical of electronic voting systems and Election Systems and Software (ES&S). The segment focused on defective screens found on an older version of the iVotronics never used in South Carolina. The story also criticized working conditions in a manufacturing plant in the Philippines where iVotronics are assembled. Ms. Andino reported no media inquiries had been received as a result of this story.

Commissioner Green reminded commissioners that any media inquiries regarding this HDNet program should be forwarded to Chris Whitmire, Public Information Officer.

Ms. Andino reported on the 2008 presidential preference primaries. Ms. Andino stated that the political parties have until 90 days prior to the primaries to set dates for the presidential preference primaries. Legislation allows the State Election Commission and counties to provide cost-effective measures in conducting the presidential preference primaries. We are preparing guidelines for county offices to combine precincts while ensuring that voters have adequate notice and access to the polling places. We are meeting with counties on August 22, 2007 to give instructions and answer any questions they might have. The law also allows the State Election Commission to set filing fees. This is the only election in which the State Election Commission can set filing fees.

Chairman Hudgens suggested that the State Election Commission should charge the maximum allowable amount of \$20,000 for filing fees to help defray the cost of conducting the primaries. Commissioner Green stated that he thought that the State Election Commission should recoup the costs to the extent possible.

Chairman Hudgens made a motion to seek the maximum amount for candidate filings. Mrs. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino reported on the special election for House District 94. She stated that this is the fifth special election held this year. The purpose of the special election is to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the two year term due to the vacancy created when Converse A. Chellis, III was elected State Treasurer. The State Board of Canvassers will need to meet on the following dates:

October 16 Primary
October 30 Runoff, if necessary
December 4 Special Election

Ms. Andino circulated a special election calendar highlighting when the Board of Canvassers shall meet in Columbia to certify elections for House District 124, Senate District 25, and House District 94. Ms. Andino recommended moving the regularly scheduled State Election

Commission meeting from the third Wednesday in September (the 19th) to Friday, September 21. Ms. Andino also recommended that the Wednesday, October 17 meeting be moved to Friday, October 19. The Commission agreed to the proposal.

Ms. Andino reported on the status of Fiscal Year 2008-09 Budget Request. Ms. Andino advised that the State Election Commission is working on our budget request for the General Election. The budget request will also include county commission members pay, maintenance of effort, and monies to continue our voter education and outreach program.

Mrs. Bensch expressed concern with her local DMV office completing voter registration applications.

Mrs. Bensch also asked if the Commission has authority over counties in regards to removing persons who are deceased from the voter records. Ms. Andino advised that we do not have authority over counties. The Agency receives reports from the Bureau of Vital Statistics when a person dies. The voter records are then made inactive.

Ms. Andino reported on the software and firmware upgrades for the voting system. In June, the Commission certified ES&S Unity software and firmware. Staff are currently going to counties to perform the upgrades. Forty-three counties will be completed by the end of August.

Mrs. Bensch asked about the voter registration system. Ms. Andino explained the attempt to have a new voter registration system written by the CIO's office. The Agency has requested a complete refund and is trying to reach an equitable settlement.

Mrs. Pinson made a motion to adjourn. Mrs. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

There being no further business the Board adjourned.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission to order and stated for the record that the meeting had been properly posted and all required notifications had been made.

Chairman Hudgens asked if everyone had a chance to review the minutes of August 15, 2007, and the other commissioners responded they had. No one indicated any changes to be made. Mr. Green made a motion to approve the minutes as is. Mr. Pritchard seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Hudgens asked if everyone had a chance to review the minutes of September 7, 2007, and the other commissioners responded they had. No one indicated any changes to be made. Mr. Pritchard made a motion to approve the minutes as is. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino stated that the SEC continues to plan and make progress in preparation for the 2008 Presidential Preference Primaries. She said we are close to knowing for certain the dates of both the Republican and Democratic Primaries, which are currently set for January 19 and January 29, respectively. The SEC continues to work with counties to develop plans for combining polling places, but some counties are getting opposition to this from their local political parties. Ms. Andino stated that the combining of polling places is provided for in state law, and we are moving forward with this effort. However, she stated some counties are choosing not to combine polling places as they are finding their budget will allow them to open them all.

Ms. Andino reported that the SEC had submitted their budget request for the 2008-2009 fiscal year. Budget priorities are as follows:

1. Maintenance of effort - \$225,000 (recurring).
2. Funding for the General Election - \$3.575 million (one-time).
3. \$115,000 for full funding of county election commissioner pay (recurring).
4. \$600,000 for new voter registration system development (one-time).

Ms. Andino provided a legislative update for the upcoming legislative session. She stated there had been questions raised about the constitutionality of the legislation that combined many of the county voter registration boards and election commissions. She said we could see legislation

introduced that would combine all county boards and commissions. She stated she is currently working with Senate Judiciary staff to have legislation introduced for the following:

1. Changing the requirement that the SEC meet in person to certify special elections so that the Board could certify via conference call.
2. Changing the date by which political parties must certify their candidates for President from September 10 to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in September.
3. Change the date for county election commissions to certify general elections from "on Friday" to "by Friday."

Ms. Andino also stated that the number one legislative priority of the S.C. Association of Registration and Election Officials (SCARE) was removing the requirement for a witness signature on the absentee ballot envelope. She also stated this is a recommendation of the Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP).

Dates were set for the next meetings of the State Election Commission and the State Board of Canvassers. The Board of Canvassers will meet on October 5, 2007, to certify the results of the Senate District 25 Republican Primary Runoff. On October 19, 2007, the Board of Canvassers will meet to certify the results of the House District 94 Republican Primary, and the SEC will hold its monthly meeting.

Mr. Pritchard made a motion to adjourn. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

THE MEETING OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION WAS HELD PURSUANT TO THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT AND ALL REQUIRED NOTIFICATIONS WERE MADE.

Commissioner Green called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and stated for the record that the meeting had been properly posted and all required notifications had been made.

The Minutes from the September 21 and October 5, 2007 meetings were considered for approval. Commissioner Green asked if the other commissioners had a chance to review the minutes. The other commissioners responded they had and indicated that no changes were necessary. Mr. Green declared the minutes approved as written.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the status of the Presidential Preference Primary. Ms. Andino stated that the SC Republican Party has certified the date of their Presidential Preference Primary to be held on Saturday, January 19, 2008. The SC Democratic Party has not certified an official date but indicated that they would like to hold their primary on Saturday, January 26, 2008. The SEC has some concerns regarding holding the primaries within a one week period.

Ms. Andino stated that the SEC has talked with both political parties. Counties offices have indicated that it would be difficult for them to get poll managers to work two Saturdays in a row and are concerned about the availability of polling places on Saturdays.

Mrs. Royson stressed that there are tedious tasks to perform before and following an election and our counties are using a new version of the voting system software.

Ms. Andino stated that there could be another issue to address concerning the Presidential Preference Primaries. A citizen has inquired about including an advisory question to the ballot for the Democratic Primary. Ms. Andino stated that adding questions complicates the voting process by increasing the amount of time voters remain in the voting booth. The Commission may have to decide or consult with the attorney general's office on whether an advisory question may be added.

Commissioner Green agreed that the attorney general's office should be contacted for advice if a formal request is made by either party.

Ms. Andino reported on the agency's audit. Ms. Andino stated that an audit has been conducted on the federal HAVA funds. A recent audit showed a significant deficiency involving a miscalculation of matching funds. The Commission calculated the State match by multiplying 5% by the total grant funds instead of dividing the total grant amount by 95%, thus we short changed ourselves. The state treasurer's office disagrees with the Inspector General's Office and the Election Assistance Commission's interpretation of the law regarding the deposit of state funds to the Election Fund's restricted account where the funds would accrue interest. Janet Reynolds, Finance Director has sent a letter to the state treasurer's office to resolve this issue.

Next under new business, Ms. Andino reported that SC will host the National Association of State Election Directors (NASSED) Southern Region Conference. She stated the Southern Region Conference will be held in Charleston late November. Agenda items include how states support voting systems, disaster preparedness, internet sites for election officials, on-line poll manager training and testing, media relations and federal legislation.



Mr. Pritchard made the motion to adopt a policy consistent with the refund guidelines for the June primaries; therefore, no refunds will be made after this date. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.



Counties are in compliance with the December 5th deadline for mailing absentee ballots to military and overseas voters. On December 6th the SEC held a PPP training session for counties. Topics included: differences between conducting a regular primary versus the PPP, security and media relations. In addition to reporting results by county and precinct, for the PPP we will also report results by congressional districts. The SEC will be mailing election supplies such as envelopes, pencils, pens, etc. to counties next week.

Ms. Andino gave an update on the Agency's Audit. Ms. Andino stated since the commission meeting last month, a meeting with the State Treasurer's office resulted in state matching funds being placed in an interest bearing account. This action resolves the finding in the audit report.

Ms. Andino reported on the Annual SCARE Conference. The annual conference is usually held in January but due to the PPP's it has been moved to March. The conference will be held at the Myrtle Beach Marriott from March 4 – 7. The agency's program will be conducted on Thursday, March 6.

Chairman Hudgens stated that he will make an appearance on Thursday and speak for the Commission. Commissioners will check their calendars to see if they can attend also. No commission meeting will be held at the conference.

Ms. Andino reported on the lawsuit filed with the District Court in New York. Agency's counsel, Mr. Emory Smith with the Office of the Attorney General, filed a motion to dismiss and a memorandum in support of the motion for members of the Commission named in the Schulz v. State of New York lawsuit.

Ms. Andino reported on the National Association of State Election Directors (NASSED) Southern Region Conference held in Charleston, SC on November 28-30, 2007. South Carolina hosted the conference with 10 southern states attending. Some of the topics discussed were voter registration and elections, implementing bilingual ballots after the 2010 census, disaster preparedness, federal legislation and an update from the Department of Justice.

Chairman Hudgens asked if there were any other business to discuss. Hearing none, he asked for a motion to adjourn.

Mr. Pritchard made a motion to adjourn the meeting of the State Election Commission. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

THE MEETING OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION WAS HELD PURSUANT TO THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT AND ALL REQUIRED NOTIFICATIONS WERE MADE.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and stated for the record that the meeting had been properly posted and all required notifications had been made.

The Minutes from the December 7, 2007, January 25, 2008, February 1, 2008 and February 8, 2008 meetings were considered for approval.

Mr. Pritchard made a motion to approve the minutes as submitted. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino reported on the Annual SCARE Conference. Ms. Andino reminded the Commission that the conference will be held at the Myrtle Beach Marriott from March 4 – 7. The agency's program will be conducted on Thursday, March 6.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the status of the 2008 Presidential Preference Primaries (PPP). Ms. Andino stated that the agency is processing reimbursements to counties for their PPP expenditures. The number of poll managers used in the primaries was reduced and polling places were combined to adhere to budgetary guidelines.

The agency has brought in temporary employees to help with checking and making corrections to the voter registration lists prior to scanning. To date, eighteen counties have been scanned. Political parties are requesting the purchase of these voter registration lists before candidates filing begins on March 16.

Chairman Hudgens stated his appreciation to Ms. Andino for the article she submitted complimenting counties and poll workers on a job well done and thanking voters for participating in the voting process.

Next under new business, Ms. Andino reported on the Request for Proposal for a Learning Management Systems (LMS). Ms. Andino stated that the SEC has awarded the contract to SOE Software. The Agency has been working with SOE Software for several

weeks to implement a program to train poll workers over the internet. The LMS will provide for an interactive, multimedia (video, graphics, and audio) experience which will appeal to adult learning styles. It will provide an assessment tool to track learner's progress towards completion of each module. This program will ensure that all poll managers, regardless of county, receive the same level of training. The poll worker training course will be in place later this year.

Chairman Hudgens asked if the training could be broadened to include others such as SEC commissioners. Ms. Andino replied yes and stated that once in place the Commission will be given a demonstration.

Ms. Andino reported on the upcoming statewide Primary. Ms. Andino stated that filing opens on March 16 at noon and closes on March 30 at noon. The following offices up for election are: U.S. Senate, U.S. House of Representatives, State Senate, State House of Representatives, solicitor, and countywide and less than countywide offices. Political parties have been notified of filing dates. An Attorney General's Opinion dated February 19 states that in order to qualify as a candidate to run in the general election, all candidates seeking nomination by political party primary or political party convention must file a statement of intention of candidacy between noon on March sixteenth and noon on March thirtieth, both dates fall on a Sunday. There is no exception in Section 7-11-15 should March sixteenth and March thirtieth fall on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday.

Ms. Andino reminded the Commission that any protest or appeals from the statewide primary will be heard by the political parties. The Board of Canvassers has until noon on June 14 to certify the statewide primary. Ms. Andino recommended that the Commission tentatively mark their calendars for Saturday, June 14 at 10:00 a.m. for canvassing the results.

Chairman Hudgens stated that the date for the next monthly meeting will be for March 19 at 10 a.m. He asked Ms. Andino to add to the agenda an update on the Voter Registration System and the cost of conducting the presidential primaries.

Chairman Hudgens asked if there were any upcoming special elections to certify. Ms. Andino replied that the special election for House District 92 will be held on March 25 and will need to be certified within ten days after the election.

Ms. Andino provided a Legislative update. Ms. Andino stated that there were a number of elections bills that have been introduced. One bill would require photo identification on voter registration cards. The second bill would require candidates to have drug tests before filing intention of candidacy and the third bill would require proof of U.S. citizenship before registering to vote. A birth certificate or passport could be used as proof.

Ms. Andino reported that the amended bill for the board of canvassers to meet via telephone instead of in the Columbia office to certify elections has been introduced in the Senate and has not gone to subcommittee.

Chairman Hudgens asked if there were any other business to discuss. Hearing none, he asked for a motion to adjourn.

Mr. Pritchard made a motion to adjourn the meeting of the State Election Commission. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

THE MEETING OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION WAS HELD PURSUANT TO THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT AND ALL REQUIRED NOTIFICATIONS WERE MADE.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and asked if all notifications required by the Freedom of Information Act had been made. Ms. Andino replied that they had been made.

Mr. Hudgens announced the names of those present for the benefit of Ms. Bensch, who joined the meeting by conference call.

The minutes of the meetings of February 20, 2008, and March 31, 2008, were considered for approval. Mr. Green made a motion to approve the minutes of both meetings. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino reported on the status of tasks related to the 2008 Presidential Preference Primaries (PPPs) saying the Agency has completed the process of scanning the voter registration lists and producing voter history. She said the SEC is now in the process of reimbursing counties for expenditures related to the PPPs. Mr. Hudgens asked if the negative media attention associated with the PPP seemed to be dying down. Ms. Andino said that it had, but that the issue continues to be mentioned in some national election news stories. She also said that it continues to be an issue in Horry County where County Council has formed a committee to look into voting machine issues. She said the SEC will provide input to the committee. Ms. Andino also stated that a bill had been introduced in the General Assembly that would require the SEC to conduct all PPPs.

The next item discussed was the development of the Learning Management System (LMS). Ms. Andino described some of the features of the LMS and how the system would be used to train poll workers and county election staff. She said she felt that it will improve training and provide a consistent message from the SEC. She said the Agency is currently finishing up development, training has begun, and full implementation would begin in May. Ms. Bensch asked if members of the SEC could have a demonstration of the system, and Ms. Andino said that could be arranged.

Mr. Hudgens asked for a report on preparations for the 2008 State Primaries. Ms. Andino reported the SEC is working in a short window to prepare ballots prior to the federally mandated 45-day deadline. Ms. Andino described the ballot preparation process and how it is always difficult to meet the deadline. Mr. Hudgens asked if candidates who withdraw could be removed from the ballot. Ms. Andino stated they would be removed, but that it depended on how far along a particular county's ballots were in the preparation process. Mr. Hudgens asked if it would be helpful for the SEC to set a consistent deadline for all candidates to withdraw and have their name removed from the ballot. Mr. Hudgens stated he was concerned that under the current policy, candidates are treated differently depending on the point at which their county's ballots are in the preparation process. Ms. Andino said a deadline may be helpful. Mr. Hudgens said the issue could be considered at a later time. Ms. Andino notified the Commission they would be required by law to meet on June 14, 2008, and June 28, 2008, to certify the results of the June 10 Primaries and June 24 Runoffs, respectively. Mr. Hudgens, Ms. Bensch, and Mr. Green discussed scheduling challenges and asked Ms. Andino to contact Ms. Pamella B. Pinson regarding her schedule. Mr. Green requested a calendar be distributed to members periodically showing required meetings looking one year forward.

The next item was an update on election-related legislation. Ms. Andino said S911, which would allow the SEC to meet by phone, had passed the House, but not the Senate. She said it would likely not be precleared by June 14, 2008. Ms. Andino said S914, which would change the date by which presidential candidates must be certified, passed the Senate. Ms. Andino said H4725 had passed the House. H4725 would require the names of candidates who are nominated by more than one political party to be listed only once on the ballot. Ms. Andino explained that the voting system could not accommodate this requirement and the cost of changing the system could be millions of dollars. Ms. Andino detailed how an incorrect agency fiscal impact statement was submitted by the Office of State Budget on the Agency's behalf without the Agency's knowledge or input. Ms. Andino said she had a letter from the budget office detailing this event and is working on preparing a true and definitive fiscal impact statement.

Ms. Andino stated there were two issues to bring before the board regarding "fusion" candidates. Ms. Andino asked for further clarification on whether a candidate, who files a statement of intention of candidacy form with one party during the filing period and is nominated by his party, and who is subsequently nominated by another party, would be required to file a second statement of intention of candidacy (SIC) form with the second party. There was some discussion, and Mr. Green moved to require this second SIC form. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino informed the Board that the United Citizens Party had indicated they planned to nominate Barack Obama as their candidate for President of the United States for the 2008 General Election. Mr. Baum explained the differences between fusion candidacy on the state level and fusion candidacy for President. He presented the Commission with three questions: Is fusion allowed for presidential candidates? If so, should the SEC get some acknowledgement in writing from the candidate accepting this second nomination? And, is staff correct in informing such parties and candidates involved that in such a case,

votes cast for the candidate would be reported separately and not combined because these votes are actually cast for two separate groups of electors, not the candidate. Mr. Hudgens replied that the answers to the three questions were yes, yes, and yes. Mr. Hudgens stated that the letter from the candidate should reflect an understanding of how presidential fusion works in South Carolina with regard to electors. Mr. Hudgens stated this letter would only apply to candidates being nominated by a second party. Mr. Green moved to adopt this practice. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Hudgens stated that the next meeting was tentatively planned for May 21, and that the Board would later have an appropriate recognition of Edward K. Pritchard, Jr.'s service to the Board.

Mr. Green made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. None were opposed, and the meeting was adjourned.

THE MEETING OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION WAS HELD PURSUANT TO THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT AND ALL REQUIRED NOTIFICATIONS WERE MADE.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and asked if all notifications required by the Freedom of Information Act had been made. Ms. Andino replied that they had been made.

The minutes of the meeting of April 16, 2008 were considered for approval. Mr. Green made a motion to approve the minutes and Ms. Penson seconded the motion.

Ms. Andino reported on the status of tasks related to the 2008 Presidential Preference Primaries (PPP) stating that all counties have received reimbursement for PPP expenditures. She stated that, with only a few invoices outstanding, there is approximately \$300,000 left in the PPP budget. This can be attributed to the legislation which allowed the State to take cost saving measures with this particular election by combining polling places and using a lesser number of poll managers. Each county was allotted an amount to pay poll managers and only one county exceeded this amount, one county used the exact amount allocated, and the remaining 44 counties did not use the entire amount they were allotted.

Ms. Andino reported on the status of tasks related to the June 10, 2008 Republican and Democratic Primaries. She stated that candidate filing had closed and all filing fees have been collected. SEC staff have conducted training programs for county offices in the areas of preparation for the June primaries, the election night reporting system, and the Internet based learning management system. County election officials are currently conducting poll manager training and election day technician training. The SEC is assisting Horry County with their election day technician training. All election definitions for use with the statewide voting system have been completed and were delivered to each county prior to the April 26, 2008 deadline for mailing ballots to uniformed and overseas voters as required by the Uniformed and Overseas

Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA). All county voter registration offices mailed absentee ballots to UOCAVA voters prior to the deadline.

Ms. Andino notified the Commissioners that we will be using an Election Day notification system on June 10th, 2008 for the first time. This system provides the capability to contact various groups of people, such as poll workers, election day technicians, and county election offices, in a short period of time. The service can be used to provide updates to each of the groups, provide issue resolution messages, provide notification of changes such as polls closing time, and survey the groups to gather data.

Ms. Andino also notified the Commissioners that the SEC will be providing special assistance to Florence County prior to the June 10th primaries because the Director of Elections in Florence was indicted on federal embezzlement charges and is currently hospitalized. SEC staff will assist with filling this void.

The next item discussed was legislation. Ms. Andino remarked that 2008 has been a slow legislative session. The SEC budget for the General Election, currently assigned to conference committee, was reduced by \$400,000 from \$3.1M to \$2.7M. The Senate is planning to restore these funds and change their funding source from the Capital Reserve to the General Appropriation Funds. Legislation allowing the SEC to certify election results via teleconference has passed the Senate and waiting for action from the House Judiciary Committee. Mr. Hudgens said that he would contact Representative Harrison, Chair of the House Judiciary Committee, and request prompt action on the legislation. Ms. Andino said that she would contact Representative Clemmons with the same request.

Ms. Andino reported that the State Auditor's office recently conducted a Single Audit of federal funds expended by the SEC. The audit produced the following three findings: 1) the SEC did not complete a required Schedule of Financial Assistance, 2) matching funds were calculated incorrectly, and 3) interest was not properly reported on the SF-269 report. All three issues have since been corrected. Mr. Hudgens asked how often these Federal audits are performed and Ms. Andino stated that the State Auditor performs audits on federal funds once per year.

The Commissioners received dates of commission meetings, certification meetings, and tentative dates for protest/appeal hearings for the remainder of the 2008 calendar year. Mr. Hudgens asked that all commissioners review the dates and notify him if they have any known conflicts. Ms. Andino asked that commissioners note the dates associated with possible protest and appeal hearings on their calendars and expect to meet in Columbia for several of these dates to conduct the hearings.

Commissioners discussed and agreed to hold the June monthly commission meeting on June 28, 2008 which is the same date as certification for the June 24, 2008 Republican and Democratic Run-off. Ms. Andino said that a citizen from Sumter County has asked to be heard at the next Commission Meeting and Mr. Hudgens instructed her to extend an invitation to the citizen for the June 28, 2008 meeting.

Mr. Garry Baum gave a brief demonstration of a Learning Management System (LMS) being utilized for the purpose of complimenting the current poll manager training program. Each poll


manager will access the LMS through the SEC website www.scvotes.org by entering a user identification and password. The LMS will display available courses on the left of the screen and the course content on the right. Each course contains several lessons. Presentations of the lessons vary depending on the lesson content. Lessons are presented in text, audio, video, and interactive modes. At the end of each lesson is a test and the user must pass the test, with at least an 80% passing grade, before advancing to the next lesson. County election officials will have the ability to view the training status of all poll managers in their county by accessing another portion of the LMS. This status includes test scores, lists of users who have completed the course, and notification of how many times a poll manager took each test. In addition to lessons on legal requirements and procedures for the election, lessons are also available for proper treatment of individuals, conflict management, and concerns of persons with disabilities.

Mr. Hudgens requested that the State Election Commission members receive access to the new LMS and that each Commissioner take the poll manager training course to become familiar with Election Day procedures. He stated that this would be useful when conducting protest and appeal hearings. Ms. Andino assured him that Commissioners would receive access. Mr. Hudgens further pointed out that this program would be a great review for poll managers immediately prior to Election Day.

The next meeting of the State Election Commission was scheduled for June 28, 2008 at 11:00.

Ms. Pinson made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Mr. Green seconded the motion. None were opposed, and the meeting was adjourned.

THE MEETING OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION WAS HELD PURSUANT TO THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT AND ALL REQUIRED NOTIFICATIONS WERE MADE.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and asked if all notices of the meeting were posted as required by the Freedom of Information Act. Ms. Royson replied that the notices had been posted.

The first item of business was to approve the minutes of the May 21, 2008, meeting of the State Election Commission. Ms. Bensch made a motion to approve the minutes. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

The next item on the agenda was discussion of whether candidates who have been defeated in a primary should have access to the general election ballot. Chairman Hudgens stated that this issue was brought to the Board by the South Carolina Green Party regarding Eugene Platt, the party's candidate for South Carolina House of Representatives District 115. Ms. Royson added that Mr. Platt had been certified by the Green Party as their official candidate for that seat. Chairman Hudgens asked if Mr. Platt had been defeated in the June 10, 2008, Democratic Party. Ms. Royson replied that he had. Ms. Royson said that SEC staff had informed the Green Party that it was their belief that the law would not allow the SEC to place Mr. Platt's name on the ballot due to the provisions of S.C. Code of Laws § 7-11-10.

Chairman Hudgens reminded his fellow commissioners that they had copies of laws, court cases, and Attorney General's opinions related to the question at hand. Mr. Jocoy said that he and other members of the public in attendance had not been provided with copies of the same. Chairman Hudgens pointed out that the documents were freely available to the public. After some discussion, Chairman Hudgens asked Mr. Baum to make copies of the documents for those in the room who wanted them.

Ms. Bensch asked if a reversal of SEC staff policy would provide ballot access to all candidates who lost in the June primary. Ms. Royson replied that if SEC staff continued to apply the law as they had been applying it, the ballot would not be open to other losing candidates.

Mr. Green made a motion for the meeting go into a 10 minute recess while copies were made. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously and the meeting was in recess.

After approximately 10 minutes, Chairman Hudgens called the meeting back to order and noted that the copies had been distributed. Chairman Hudgens reiterated that the South Carolina Green Party has indicated they want Mr. Platt's name placed on the General Election ballot, and that SEC staff has responded that state law prevents them from doing so. Chairman Hudgens said that for the staff's application of the law to change, he would first need to hear a motion from a member of the Commission. Chairman Hudgens stated that it was the Commission's wish to hear from those in attendance who wanted to speak on the matter and asked speakers to limit comments to three minutes.

Mr. Crangle spoke in support of Mr. Platt's name appearing on the ballot saying it was not the legislative intent of S.C. Code of Laws § 7-11-10 to prevent a candidate who lost a primary from appearing on the general election ballot as a candidate of another party. Mr. Crangle also stated that Mr. Platt's first amendment rights may be violated if Mr. Platt's name is not allowed on the ballot.

Mr. Richardson identified himself as an attorney representing the South Carolina Democratic Party and the party's nominee for State House District 115. Mr. Richardson spoke against allowing Mr. Platt's name to appear on the ballot. Mr. Richardson stated that this situation was not unique, that the statute specifically addressed it, and that the statute had been ruled constitutional by the Supreme Court of South Carolina.

Mr. Platt spoke in support of his name appearing on the General Election ballot as the Green Party's nominee saying that early in the process, the Democratic Party had no problem with him being another party's nominee. Mr. Platt also stated that the Green party had nominated him prior to being defeated in the Democratic Primary.

Mr. Marley spoke against allowing Mr. Platt's name to appear on the ballot, saying that the law in question had been on the books for some time, and that Mr. Platt had every opportunity to review those laws before filing for office with any party.

Mr. Jocoy spoke in support of Mr. Platt's name appearing on the General Election ballot, delivering a written statement, which is attached.

Chairman Hudgens asked if anyone else wished to speak, and none did. Ms. Bensch moved that the meeting go into executive session. Chairman Hudgens asked Ms. Bensch her purpose for moving to go into executive session. Ms. Bensch replied that she desired the Board to receive legal advice. Ms. Pinson seconded the motion. The room was cleared while the Commissioners and Mr. Hunter met in executive session.

Attendees were notified when the executive session was complete. Chairman Hudgens called the meeting back to order and stated that no votes were to be taken and no decisions were made during the session.

Chairman Hudgens asked if there were any motions to be made regarding the question at hand, and there were none.

Mr. Green stated his reasoning for not making a motion, saying that most of the arguments in favor of allowing Mr. Platt's name to appear on the ballot related to the constitutional rights of

the candidate. Mr. Green stated that the SEC had only the authority to enforce the election law and not go behind the law to determine its constitutionality. Mr. Green stated that the SEC can only enforce the law as it is plainly written.

Chairman Hudgens echoed the remarks of Mr. Green and thanked everyone in the room for their attendance. There being no further business, Ms. Pinson made a motion to adjourn the meeting of the State Election Commission. Mr. Waring seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously and the meeting was adjourned.

THE MEETING OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION WAS HELD PURSUANT TO THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT AND ALL REQUIRED NOTIFICATIONS WERE MADE.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and asked if all notices of the meeting were posted as required by the Freedom of Information Act. Ms. Andino replied that the notices had been posted.

The first item of business was to approve the minutes of the June 27, 2008, meeting of the State Election Commission. Mr. Green made a motion to approve the minutes. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

The second item of business was to discuss fusion candidacies for President of the United States. Ms. Andino stated there had been additional questions from political parties regarding fusion candidacies for President of the United States. She stated, as discussed in an earlier SEC meeting, that votes for the same candidate under nominations by separate parties would not be combined because the votes would actually be for separate groups of electors. However, Andino stated the question has been raised as to whether the SEC would combine votes in a situation where two parties nominated the same candidate and also had the same group of electors. She pointed out that in the 1972 General Election; one candidate appeared on the ballot twice, as the nominee of two separate parties, both parties having the same set of electors. Andino stated she sees nothing that would prevent us from combining the votes in such a situation.

Chairman Hudgens stated the next order of business was to discuss petition candidacies. Ms. Andino stated that 12:00 noon, July 15, 2008, was the deadline to submit nominating petitions federal, state, and multi-county offices to the SEC. As of the deadline, the SEC had received six petitions: Ralph Nader, President of the United States; Bill Collins, State Senate District 38; Kenny McLaughlin, State House of Representatives District 55; Brian Doyle, State House of Representatives District 82; John Bass, Aiken School Board District 1; and Frances Alberta Williams, Aiken School Board District 1.

Ms. Andino stated that the Doyle Petition would not be checked due to the fact that he was not qualified to hold office under the felony provision of the S.C. Constitution. She stated that the SEC had received written confirmation of his conviction and the fact that it had not been 15 years since the completion of his sentence. Andino stated Mr. Doyle would be informed of his petition status in writing.

Ms. Andino stated that the McLaughlin Petition was submitted in a format outside of the norm. She explained Mr. McLaughlin began his petition drive collecting signatures on 8.5" x 11" paper. After learning of the requirement that the petition be on 8.5" x 14" paper, he began collecting signatures on the appropriate sized paper. Fifty-nine pages of the 94-page petition were on 8.5" x 14" paper. Mr. McLaughlin then photocopied the entire petition on 8.5" x 14" paper. Mr. McLaughlin submitted both the originals and the copies to the SEC. Chairman Hudgens stated he felt that Mr. McLaughlin had complied with the spirit of the law and the board should move to accept the petition. Mr. Green agreed with Mr. Hudgens stating that S.C. Code of Laws §7-11-80 addresses the size requirement, but does not address rejecting a petition. However, §7-11-85 addresses rejection, but does not address the size requirement. Mr. Green stated when it comes to acceptance or rejection, what is most important is 7-11-85 and the signatures. Mr. Green stated this issue could perhaps be clarified legislatively.

Mr. Green moved to accept the petition as submitted for processing and verification. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

Chairman Hudgens asked Ms. Andino for a report on General Election preparations. Ms. Andino stated the election was 3.5 months away. She stated the Agency is planning a training session in September for county election officials. The Voter Services Division had begun database preparation. She stated the next major deadline is the federal requirement for absentee ballots to be mailed to military and overseas citizens by September 20, 2008. Ms. Andino stated the Constitutional Ballot Commission would meet on July 30, 2008, to draft and approve explanations for constitutional amendment questions.

Ms. Andino updated the board on three ongoing projects:

1. Voter Education Month: The Agency expects the Governor to declare September "Voter Education Month." There will be a Statehouse press conference and voter registration drive planned for the first week of September. The focus of the media campaign will be voter registration and education.
2. Online Poll Manager Training: This is the first module of the Learning Management System purchased by the SEC. It could go live later this month, and counties will be encouraged to use the system to supplement in-person training for the General Election.
3. New Accounting System: The Agency will move to a new accounting system in November of this year. There will be a two week period where the Agency will be unable to process checks. Training will begin in September.

Chairman Hudgens then addressed the Board regarding meeting attendance, board members offering advice, and members' involvement in political campaigns. He urged board members to make every effort to attend all meetings. He recognized that some things are unavoidable, but that when each member accepted their appointment they agreed to attend meetings. Chairman Hudgens pointed out that it does not put forth a favorable image of the SEC when members are not physically present, particularly when members of the public are in attendance. He asked that SEC staff notify each board member via e-mail of the remaining meetings of the year, including the window to hear protests and appeals.

Chairman Hudgens asked members to use caution when members of the public ask questions regarding election matters. He urged members to be careful how these election-related questions are addressed because any response could be taken as a view or position of the Board as a whole. Chairman Hudgens also pointed out that almost everything the Board is involved with has a second side. He stated that it is the Board's responsibility to ensure that everything we do is fair and open. He stated that board members should be careful to avoid giving any candidates or parties any unfair or private advice.

Chairman Hudgens presented members with copies of the Board's Political Activity Guidelines, and reviewed the guidelines document with them. He stated that is not enough members actions to be right by the law and the Board's guidelines, but it must look right as well. He stated he would contact Tom and Pam to go over the guidelines with them.

Ms. Andino and the Board discussed when to hold the next monthly meeting. Due to scheduling conflicts, a specific date was not selected.

There being no further business, Mr. Green made a motion to adjourn the meeting of the State Election Commission. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously and the meeting was adjourned.

Chairman Hudgens asked SEC staff to ask candidates submitting such affidavits in the future to provide more information regarding what had changed in their situations since filing for office that led them to decide to withdraw.

Mr. Waring moved to approve the affidavit as constituting a legitimate, non-political reason. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

There being no further business, Mr. Green made a motion to adjourn the meeting of the State Election Commission. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously and the meeting was adjourned.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and asked if all notices of the meeting were posted as required by the Freedom of Information Act. Ms. Andino replied that the notices had been posted.

Chairman Hudgens stated the meeting had been called to hear concerns raised regarding the petition to place the name of Bill Collins as a candidate for State Senate District 38 on the General Election ballot. Introductions of board members, staff, and those requesting to be heard were made.

Chairman Hudgens stated that SEC staff had rendered the decision that the Collins petition was valid, and the decision stands as is. He stated that to change that decision would require a motion from a board member to do so. Chairman Hudgens stated that it was the board's wish to hear from those who wanted to be heard on the matter. Seven attendees requested the opportunity to speak. Mr. Hudgens stated that comments will be limited to five minutes, with Arthur Bryngelson having an additional three minutes at the end of all the speakers since he was bringing the complaint to the board.

Mr. Collins spoke on his own behalf. Mr. Bryngelson made concluding remarks. Mr. Dawson made additional remarks. Ms. Rosensweig made additional remarks.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and asked if all notices of the meeting were posted as required by the Freedom of Information Act. Ms. Andino replied that the notices had been posted.

The first item of business was to approve the minutes of the July 16, 2008 and July 29, 2008 meetings of the State Election Commission. Mr. Green made a motion to approve the minutes from July 16, 2008. Mr. Waring seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. Mr. Green made a motion to approve the minutes from July 29, 2008. Mr. Waring seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

The minutes from the August 12, 2008 meeting will be considered during the commission meeting next month.

Ms. Andino reported on the status of legal issues. First, she said a request for re-hearing was received regarding the Collins petition. The request for re-hearing had been denied and there has been no additional communication in this matter. Next, Ms. Andino gave an update regarding the Green Party v. State Election Commission matter following the denial of ballot access for Mr. Eugene Platt. A Motion for a Preliminary Injunction and Complaint were filed by the ACLU on behalf of the Green Party. Mr. Andrew Lindemann was retained to represent the Agency. She stated further that she would contact Mr. Lindemann to inform him of the urgency to resolve this issue by the September 20 deadline.

The next items discussed were the FY 09/10 budget request and budget reduction for FY 08/09. Ms. Andino said that we have been notified of a three percent across the board reduction for the current fiscal year. The \$40,653 reduction will be taken from funds allocated to defray the cost of keeping voter registration offices open during court house hours. Ms. Andino further said that we are preparing the Agency budget request for FY 09/10. The Agency's only priority for 2010 is funding to conduct the primaries. We are also asking for a Proviso change that would allow the Agency to use carry forward funds remaining after a General Election or Primary to purchase a new voter registration system. It is critical for us to have a new voter registration system before reapportionment in 2012.

Ms. Andino reported on the preparations for the General Election (GE). She said that there are 69 more days to go before the GE. Most candidate names, except for President/Vice President, have been received and the Voter Services Division is preparing election definition databases for 40 of the 46 counties. We will have all databases ready before the September 20 deadline to

mail absentee ballots. On September 18, the SEC will conduct a pre-general election training session for counties. Topics include changes in legislation, media relations, and protest hearings. In addition, a protest hearing training class will be conducted by Commissioner Tracey Green on September 24 in Columbia.



These events mark a month-long effort to raise awareness about voter registration and the upcoming election.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and asked if all notices of the meeting were posted as required by the Freedom of Information Act. Ms. Andino replied that the notices had been posted.

The first order of business was the approval of minutes from the August 12, 2008, and August 27, 2008, meetings. Not everyone was able to review the minutes prior to the meeting, and Chairman Hudgens stated the approval of minutes would be carried forward to the next meeting.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the lawsuit filed against the SEC by the South Carolina Green Party. Ms. Andino provided the members with copies of the Commission's reply to the lawsuit prepared by the Commission's attorney. Andino stated that a hearing would be held in U.S. District Court at 1:30 p.m. on September 18th. Andino stated she planned to attend.

Ms. Andino presented the Commission with a calendar of important, upcoming dates related to the General Election on which members would be required to be available to meet and hold hearings.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the status of preparations for the General Election, noting that it was only 48 days away. Andino stated that she was confident all counties would meet the federally-mandated 45-day deadline to mail absentee ballots to military and overseas citizens. Ms. Andino noted there is a tremendous amount of interest in the election, and recent voter registration increases reflect that interest. Ms. Andino said SEC staff will conduct a General Election training workshop on September 18th, and that Mr. Green would be conducting a class in the coming weeks on Protest Hearings as part of the SEC's Training and Certification Program. Ms. Andino summarized the SEC's Voter Education Month initiative and related activities, noting that some events had been cancelled, postponed, or scaled back due to the gasoline shortage.

Ms. Andino stated that final changes were being made to the Online Poll Manager Training program. The site should go live next week.

Ms. Andino stated she expected a smooth transition to the new accounting software, SCEIS. Staff is attending training. Ms. Andino said some processes will need to be adjusted, but she expects it to be a great improvement over the current accounting software.

Chairman Hudgens stated the next meeting would take place on October 15, 2008, at 10:00 a.m.

Chairman Hudgens called the meeting of the State Election Commission (SEC) to order and asked if all notices of the meeting were posted as required by the Freedom of Information Act. Ms. Andino replied that the notices had been posted.

The first order of business was the approval of minutes from the meetings of August 12, 2008; August 27, 2008; and September 17, 2008. Mr. Green moved to approve the minutes as they were written. Mr. Waring seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on a county request to purchase new voting equipment. The new equipment will feature minor changes, which will not require certification by the SEC. These changes were determined to be "de minimis" changes by the Independent Testing Authorities.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on an issue in Aiken County regarding opening of satellite absentee precincts. Ms. Andino stated that the Aiken County attorney had requested an opinion from the SEC or State Attorney General on whether it is permissible for the Aiken County Election Commission (CEC) to open satellite absentee precincts. Ms. Andino stated SEC staff had advised the Aiken CEC that this had been done by other counties in the past. Staff advised the Aiken CEC that this practice would seem to be allowable under S.C. Code of Laws §7-5-140, and the Aiken CEC should advertise any openings outside of normal hours and locations. SEC staff informed the Aiken County attorney that the SEC did not issue opinions. Ms. Andino stated the Attorney General's office was aware of the request.

Ms. Fowler left the meeting.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the status of state budget cuts and their potential effect on functions critical to the Agency mission. A three percent across-the-board budget cut had already been implemented. The Governor's office recently held a summit with all agency heads on the budget situation and asked them for ideas to reduce costs in their agencies. Ms. Andino stated that all SEC functions are critical and summarized the budget breakdown. Ms. Andino stated that a 10% budget cut would result in the loss of three positions.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the status of Platt vs. the S.C. State Election Commission. Ms. Andino stated that the appeal deadline had passed for Mr. Platt and no appeal was filed.

Ms. Andino updated the Commission on the status of preparations for the General Election, noting that it was only 20 days away. Ms. Andino stated that several e-mails had been circulated containing false information regarding campaign material at polling places and straight party voting. SEC staff is working to dispel these myths and others by working with the news media, political parties and campaigns, and developing polling place signage and procedures.

Ms. Andino stated that South Carolina had reached a new record number of registered voters in the state – more than 2.5 million. Also, the current rate of absentee voting will likely result in a number of absentee voters far surpassing that of the 2004 General Election. Ms. Royson stated that SEC staff is advising county election commissions to prepare for large crowds on Election Day.

Ms. Bensch asked if the group known as “ACORN” had been active in S.C. Ms. Andino said staff was not aware of any current activity by ACORN, but that they had been in the past.

Mr. Hudgens asked about the online poll manager training system. Ms. Andino said the system is now up and running poll managers were using it throughout the state.

Ms. Andino stated that the new accounting system is being implemented and the implementation date was November 3, 2008.

Ms. Bensch asked if the Commission was going to take up the subject of an e-mail sent her by Mr. Hudgens. Mr. Hudgens stated that he would discuss it with her, but not in the meeting. Ms. Bensch stated that she wanted to discuss it now so that it is public, and that it was a very serious charge. Ms. Bensch asked about the source of the e-mail. Mr. Hudgens stated that SEC staff became aware via an e-mail from Tim Kelly of the Indigo Journal website. Ms. Bensch stated her computer had apparently been hacked, and that her husband intended to take it up with the FBI, or other appropriate authorities. Ms. Bensch asked if other Commissioners were aware of the e-mail. Ms. Andino stated that they were not aware of the e-mail. Ms. Bensch asked that Ms. Andino make them aware, and Ms. Andino stated that she would.

The next order of business was an update on the General Election. Chairman Hudgens stated that the news story of the day seemed to be long lines at polling places. Ms. Andino stated that there was a record turnout of approximately 1.9 million voters, representing 76 percent of registered voters. Ms. Andino also stated that the number of absentee voters more than doubled over the last presidential election in 2004. Chairman Hudgens stated there didn't seem to be long lines at the end of the day as compared to past elections. He said this seemed to indicate a concern by voters over turnout at the polls, which prompted them to either vote prior to Election Day or vote early in the day on Election Day. Ms. Andino stated there were no state-level recounts required, but there were some recounts necessary on the local level.

Ms. Andino stated some local protests had been filed, one being in the Bluffton Town Council election. Ms. Andino stated that the Town of Bluffton had given its authority to conduct elections to the Beaufort County Election Commission, so the county board would hear the protest. Ms. Andino also stated that any appeals of the county board's decision would be heard by the SEC, in keeping with precedent of a 2006 court order relating to an appeal with similar circumstances. Mr. Green stated he would like to review the order. Ms. Andino stated she could provide Mr. Green information relating to the order. Ms. Andino recommended the Board follow the protest and appeal timeline in Title 5 of the S.C. Code of laws (as opposed to Title 7), due to the fact that it was a municipal election. After some discussion among the Commissioners, Chairman Hudgens instructed staff to continue following the Title 5 protest and appeal schedule.

The next order of business was new business. Ms. Andino stated she was receiving calls from voters and lawmakers supporting a move toward early voting. Ms. Andino stated that there was

some confusion amongst voters in the General Election about whether South Carolina had early voting. She said legislators have expressed interest in pre-filing legislation to enact early voting and have asked her for suggestions. Ms. Andino stated 31 states have some form of early voting, and that early voting is a legislative priority of the S.C. Association of Registration and Elections. She suggested early voting be available "in-person" only, and not by mail; and that the absentee voting process remain in effect for those in situations where voting by mail is necessary. Ms. Andino stated that she would continue researching early voting and work with the state legislature to help ensure any early voting programs in South Carolina would be successful.

Ms. Andino provided an update on the agency budget. She stated that there had already been a three percent cut to the budget, and now there will be a 7.9 percent cut. She stated that the actual effect of the 7.9 percent cut would be more than 13 percent when applied. She stated that all those cuts had been absorbed in operating costs; but that any more cuts, which have been rumored, would result in furloughs or reductions in force.

The next item of business was the budget proviso for a new voter registration system. Ms. Andino stated that the SEC has been trying to get funding for a new voter registration system to replace the antiquated system currently in use. She stated that it was critical to replace the old system prior to reapportionment. Ms. Andino stated that the Agency is asking to use General Election and Primary funds to go forward with development of the new system. Ms. Bensch asked if the new system would be developed by the state or a private company. Ms. Andino stated there is no state agency capable of doing this sort of development, and that there would be an open bidding process for development of any system. Ms. Bensch asked about the status of the Agency's request for a refund of a \$300,000 payment to the Division of State Information Technology (DSIT) for development of a new voter registration system. Ms. Andino stated that based on prior communications, a refund from DSIT is doubtful.

The next item of discussion was a possible appeal from the protest of the Town of Bluffton election. Ms. Andino stated there was no court reporter at the protest hearing held by the Beaufort County Election Commission, but that a detailed transcript had been taken by a county staff person. Commissioners discussed whether to ask the county commission to rehear the protest using a court reporter or to hold a full hearing on appeal at the state level. Mr. Green moved that if the SEC receives an appeal this year from the Town of Bluffton protest with no transcript, that Ms. Andino be authorized to order them to re-hold their protest hearing. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino stated that one protest had already been filed in the State House District 115 election. Commissioners discussed possible dates and times to hear the protest. Chairman Hudgens tentatively set Wednesday, December 3rd as the date to hear the protest.

There being no further business, Mr. Green moved to adjourn the meeting of the State Election Commission. Ms. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously and the meeting was adjourned.



Chairman Hudgens called the State Election Commission meeting to order.

Chairman Hudgens announced those present for the benefit of Mr. Pritchard joining the meeting by conference call.

The minutes of the May 30, 2007 meeting were considered for approval. Mr. Pritchard moved to approve the minutes. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Hudgens asked Ms. Andino for an update on developments relating to the voting system upgrade certification.

Ms. Andino reminded the commission that this issue was carried over from the last meeting pending an opinion from the State Attorney General. Ms. Andino stated a voting system cannot be certified by the SEC without first being certified by a testing laboratory accredited by the Federal Election Assistance Commission (EAC). Ms. Andino stated that as we discussed last month, ES&S Unity version 3.0.1.1 was certified by a laboratory that is currently accredited by the EAC, but the EAC had not taken over voting system certification when the software was approved by the lab. Ms. Andino stated she had requested an opinion from the State Attorney General's office on whether the Commission could approve the system under these circumstances and shared with the board a letter sent in response to her request. The Attorney General concluded in the letter that the State cannot approve a voting system certified by a laboratory, which at the time of certification was not accredited by the EAC.

Ms. Andino stated that after requesting this opinion it was discovered that Systest laboratory that certified version 3.0.1.1 was operating under an interim accreditation from

the EAC. Chairman Hudgens stated that this would seem to open the door for the SEC to certify the system.

Mrs. Pinson made a motion to certify ES&S Unity version 3.0.1.1. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

The next item on the agenda was the voter registration system update. Ms. Andino reminded the Commission that Eddie Gunn had offered a \$300,000 refund. Since the Commission spent \$1.4 million, Ms. Andino declined the offer and will work with the State Budget and Control Board to reach a more equitable resolution.

The next item of business was the Presidential Preference Primary (PPP). Ms. Andino stated that the Governor's veto of the legislation was overridden, and the legislature passed the budget containing a proviso requiring the SEC and county election commission to conduct the PPP. She stated there has been some discussion about the Republican and Democratic parties possibly holding their primaries on the same date. A meeting is planned next week with the political parties to discuss conduct of the PPP.

Mr. Green made a motion to move the meeting of the SEC into recess and to call a meeting of the State Board of Canvassers to order. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.







Commissioner Green called the meeting of the State Board of Canvassers to order for the purpose of certifying the results of the Berkeley County Senate District 44 Special Election held on Tuesday, August 7.

Ms. Andino presented the results of the Berkeley County Senate District 44 Special Election as certified to the Board. Ms. Andino advised the Board that these results are true and accurate in all material respects.

Mrs. Pinson made a motion to certify the results of Berkeley County Senate District 44 Special Election held on Tuesday, August 7. Mrs. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Green stated that the results of the Berkeley County Senate District 44 Special Election are certified by the Board of Canvassers.

Mrs. Bensch made a motion to adjourn as the Board of Canvassers and convene as the State Election Commission. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Green welcomed the State Election Commission's newest member, Mrs. Cynthia M. Bensch, stating that all seats on the Board have been filled.

Commissioner Green also welcomed Mr. Karl S. Bowers, Jr. Mr. Bowers was presented a Resolution and thanked for his dedication in serving as Chairman and a Commissioner for the State Election Commission. Commissioner Green thanked Mr. Bowers for his personal guidance to him while he was serving as an attorney with the Attorney General's Office and while working with election law issues when he served at the House Judiciary Committee. Commissioner Green stated that Mr. Bowers's leadership was outstanding and the Commission continues to do the work and recognizes his accomplishments.

Mr. Bowers expressed his appreciation for the Resolution and commended the State Election Commission for doing a fantastic job. Mr. Bowers stated that he was proud to have served on the Commission and was proud that the Commission never made a decision that was politically driven and never had a judicial court overturn a decision during his tenure as Commissioner.

Chairman Hudgens interjected that Mr. Bowers always conducted himself in a professional manner during important events such as hearings, and always made decisions that were pure and right.

Mr. Bowers responded that the State Election Commission is a tremendous Commission and he was honored to accept this Resolution.

Ms. Andino stated that the political parties have until 90 days prior to the primaries to set dates for the presidential preference primaries. Legislation allows the State Election Commission and counties to provide cost-effective measures in conducting the presidential preference primaries. We are preparing guidelines for county offices to combine precincts while ensuring that voters have adequate notice and access to the polling places. We are meeting with counties on August 22, 2007 to give instructions and answer any questions they might have. The law also allows the State Election Commission to set filing fees. This is the only election in which the State Election Commission can set filing fees.

Chairman Hudgens suggested that the State Election Commission should charge the maximum allowable amount of \$20,000 for filing fees to help defray the cost of conducting the primaries. Commissioner Green stated that he thought that the State Election Commission should recoup the costs to the extent possible.

Chairman Hudgens made a motion to seek the maximum amount for candidate filings. Mrs. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Andino reported on the special election for House District 94. She stated that this is the fifth special election held this year. The purpose of the special election is to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the two year term due to the vacancy created when Converse A. Chellis, III was elected State Treasurer. The State Board of Canvassers will need to meet on the following dates:

Ms. Andino reported on the status of Fiscal Year 2008-09 Budget Request. Ms. Andino advised that the State Election Commission is working on our budget request for the General Election. The budget request will also include county commission members pay, maintenance of effort, and monies to continue our voter education and outreach program.

Mrs. Bensch expressed concern with her local DMV office completing voter registration applications.

Mrs. Bensch also asked if the Commission has authority over counties in regards to removing persons who are deceased from the voter records. Ms. Andino advised that we do not have authority over counties. The Agency receives reports from the Bureau of Vital Statistics when a person dies. The voter records are then made inactive.

Ms. Andino reported on the software and firmware upgrades for the voting system. In June, the Commission certified ES&S Unity software and firmware. Staff are currently going to counties to perform the upgrades. Forty-three counties will be completed by the end of August.

Mrs. Bensch asked about the voter registration system. Ms Andino explained the attempt to have a new voter registration system written by the CIO's office. The Agency has requested a complete refund and is trying to reach an equitable settlement.

Mrs. Pinson made a motion to adjourn. Mrs. Bensch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.


Two members of the State Board did not call for an evidentiary hearing. Accordingly, the State Board heard the appeal in its appellate capacity.

Bowers, Jr., Esquire and M. Todd Carroll, Esquire of the firm of Nelson, Mullins, Riley & Scarborough, LLP, Attorneys for the Protestant. Mr. F. Truett Nettles, II, Esquire, of the Law Offices of F. Truett Nettles; and Mr. Matthew H. Richardson, Esquire, of the firm of Wyche-Burgess, P.A., Attorneys for Anne Peterson-Hutto, Respondent.


Chairman Hudgens convened the meeting of the State Board of Canvassers to hear the election protest of Wallace Scarborough, Candidate for the SC House of Representatives, District 115. Introductions were made. Chairman Hudgens addressed Mr. Bowers regarding a motion. Mr. Bowers stated that he would like to move to stipulate to the admissibility of public records that were obtained either pursuant to subpoena or records. Chairman Hudgens asked if there were any objections to the stipulation aforementioned evidence. Mr. Truett had no objections. Chairman Hudgens asked Mr. Bowers if he had any other motion. Mr. Bowers stated that he had two other documents to introduce into evidence (2 affidavits). Mr. Truett opposed introduction of the affidavits. After hearing arguments from both sides, Chairman Hudgens asked for a motion from the Board with regard to the affidavits and protestant's motion. Mr. Green made a motion to go into executive session and get advice from legal counsel. Mr. Waring seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. Chairman Hudgens stated that the Board would take a brief recess to receive advice of counsel.

When the Board returned from executive session, Chairman Hudgens asked for a motion to leave executive session and reconvene the hearing. He also stated that while in executive session no decisions were made. Next, he asked if there was a motion with regard to the affidavits as presented on Mr. Scarborough's behalf. Mr. Green moved that the Board deny the motion to accept the affidavits. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. Chairman Hudgens asked Mr. Bowers if there were any other motions. Mr. Nettles stated that he had a couple of stipulations. He stated that

he did not want to renew his motion but to revise his motion to remove the offending portion that he found troublesome and have those affidavits as redacted to be into evidence. Chairman Hudgens asked the Board if there was a motion on the offer of the redacted affidavits. Hearing none, then the affidavits are not admitted into evidence. Chairman Hudgens then asked for a motion from the Board. Mrs. Bensch made a motion to go into executive session. Mrs. Pinson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

The Board returned from executive session and Mr. Green made a motion to leave executive session and reconvene the hearing. Mr. Waring seconded motion. The motion passed unanimously. Chairman Hudgens commended both parties and their counsel for their presentations and asked for some clarification on the stipulations. After hearing from both parties, the Board considered the transcript below and arguments presented by Mr. Bowers and Mr. Nettles. Chairman Hudgens asked for any other motions from the Board. Mr. Waring moved to deny the Protest and allow the election to stand. Mr. Green seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. Chairman Hudgens requested Mr. Nettles to prepare an Order of the Board's decision. The hearing adjourned.

DECISION

This matter has come before the South Carolina State Election Commission upon Protest filed by Wallace Scarborough, the unsuccessful candidate in the November 4, 2008 general election for SC House District 115. This Protest was heard by the full commission on December 3, 2008, John H. Hudgens, III, Chairman, presiding. The Protestant appeared, being represented by his legal counsel, Karl S. Bowers, Jr., Esq. of Columbia, SC. The Respondent, Anne Peterson Hutto, who was the successful candidate in the November 4, 2008 general election, appeared being represented by her legal counsel, F. Truett Nettles, II, Esq, of Charleston, SC and Matthew T. Richardson, Esq. of Columbia, SC.

The Protestant called only one witness to testify, Marilyn Bowers, Executive Director of the Charleston County Board of Elections and Voter Registration. She verified the official results of this election and copies of all of these documents were admitted into evidence without objection. Ms. Bowers testified upon cross-examination that, according to Charleston County Voter Registration records, all of the voters who

voted in this election for SC House District 115 were registered voters, voting in the precincts to which they are registered. She also testified that every voter signed a statement under oath that they were qualified to vote in this election. And, she testified that she had not reviewed the information compiled by the Protestant. The Protestant also offered documents from the South Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles (SCDMV) and the Charleston County Tax Offices, arguing that some voters had addresses with these other public agencies which differed from their voter registration addresses.

The Protestant has the burden of proof in these proceedings. He must prove that the voter abandoned their prior home, the voter intended to move to a new home; the voter has actually established a new home; and the voter had no present intention to leave the new home. S.C. Code Ann. § 7-1-25. No witness testified that any particular voter had abandoned their prior home, established a new home, or had the intent to change their domicile for voting purposes. Moreover, there also was no testimony given as to the actual location of any of the addresses shown on the SCDMV records or the Charleston County Tax Records and whether those addresses were located within the same precinct or House district as that shown on the voter records. *See* S.C. Code Ann. § 7-5-440(A). Although Ms. Bowers is the official charged with determining whether a voter's address is within a precinct or district, she provided no testimony on that point.

There also was no testimony regarding the interpretation of the SCDMV records or the procedures followed by the SCDMV when a change of address is filed.¹ The basic form used by SCDMV for changes of address was admitted into the record. That form provides options for changes in address that are permanent, temporary, or mailing only.

¹ Protestant moved to admit an affidavit from SCDMV personnel as well as an affidavit from Marilyn Bowers, but the Commission denied that motion. Protestant then called Ms. Bowers to testify in person, but did not call anyone from SCDMV.

The form also provides options for the voter to change their voting address at the same time the change of address is filed with SCDMV. Counsel for Protestant stated SCDMV was unable to provide the change of address records of the identified individuals due to the time constraints at issue. Although recognizing this problem, the fact remains that this information was not before the Commission.


The Commission concludes that the Protestant has not met his burden of proof. The Commission may not overturn an election based on conjecture, speculation, or surmise.. *Fielding v. South Carolina Election Comm'n*, 305 S.C. 313, 408 S.E.2d 232 (1991). This Commission will employ every reasonable presumption in favor of sustaining a contested election. *Greene v. South Carolina Election Comm'n*, 314 S.C. 449, 445 S.E. 2d. 451 (1994).

This Commission does not find sufficient, direct evidence of illegal voting in an amount necessary to change the result of this election because there was no testimony regarding the circumstances applicable to any particular voter. The Commission recognizes that the statutory procedure regarding voters who have moved must be followed. *Gecy v. Bagwell*, 372 S.C. 237, 642 S.E.2d 569 (2007). However, it also notes that in *Gecy*, there was an agreement that a specified number of votes had been illegally cast by persons who had moved out of the precinct in which they lived. *Gecy*, 372, S.C. at 241, 642 S.E.2d at 571. Here, however, there is no agreement that any votes were illegally cast. The Commission also notes that, in *Gecy*, the municipal election commission had “inferred that other unnamed voters had voted illegally due to the short time available for investigation,” but the circuit court reversed that ruling and it was not appealed. And, the Commission notes that in *Dukes v. Redmond*, 357 S.C 454, 593


S.E.2d 606 (2004), there was testimony from the actual voters involved regarding the location of their residence and whether they actually had moved from the applicable municipality. In contrast to *Gecy* and *Dukes*, there was no testimony in this case regarding the location of any individual voter's residence, no testimony as to the elements of domicile and residence as applicable to any specific voter, and no testimony regarding the location of the applicable addresses. Moreover, Ms. Bowers testified that each of the voters signed a statement under oath that they were qualified to vote in this election.

Therefore, the Commission finds that the Protestant has not met his burden of proof necessary to overturn the election. Accordingly, the Protest of Wallace Scarborough is hereby denied and dismissed; the certified election results are affirmed; and Anne Peterson Hutto is the elected candidate for SC House District 115.

AND IT IS SO ORDERED.






Two members of the State Board did not call for an evidentiary hearing. Accordingly, the State Board heard the appeal in its appellate capacity.

AND IT IS SO ORDERED.




